Yes. Institution has Board of Studies, comprised of eminent individuals, which approves the structure and content of the curricula proposed for the various programs offered. Such contents are usually reviewed and revised as per the feedback from the various stakeholders. Once the approval is provided, academic calendars and class schedules are drawn, approved and circulated. Classes are distributed to all teaching faculty and are held as per schedule. Attendance is marked and is an eligibility criterion for appearing in examinations. Examinations are conducted every session (internal) and at the end of every semester (external). Candidate performance is evaluated, contributing to the grades. Online tools are available to monitor curriculum delivery, attendance, evaluation and assessment of performances.

The institution has adopted choice-based credit system for all of its programs to provide curricular flexibility to the students. In addition, the institution is also working towards outcomes-based education mode of curriculum delivery for the next academic year.

Every undergraduate gaining first year admission to the BSc course is allocated a Teacher-Guardian, who is a faculty member of the institution. A teacher-guardian has about 6-8 wards under his/her custody. These teacher-guardians provide assistance for the students to acclimatize to the new environs, liaise between the students and parents in matters pertaining to student welfare, mentor the students to ensure that they progress in their academic activities and performance, and where students lack, provide suitable curricular suggestions for improvement. The students and teacher-guardians meet regularly to discuss any pertinent issues. In addition, every program has its own class teachers who are responsible for the overall conduct and performance of the students in their respective programs. Students gaining admission to the postgraduate programs have their class teachers, who act as their mentors. In addition to all the above, all the faculty members of the institution take responsibility to address any specific requirements of the students that affects their studies and try to provide better learning opportunities. The heads of the department and the head of institution regularly receive feedback from the faculty members and students to ensure the conduct, development and progress of students.

2.5.2 Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

Student assessment is conducted through separate examinations, both internally and externally. In addition, students are evaluated for their soft skills via presentations and related aspects. Faculty members also provide continuous assessment of students during the classes, their ability to interact, learn and perform.

During the COVID pandemic, based on decisions made by government and the university, the School conducted onsite and virtual examinations, as and when possible. Where both these mode of examinations were not possible, the final marks of the semesters were determined based on the continuous and internal assessments of the semester, along with prior performance of the student, in line with the guidelines of the UGC.

2.5.3 Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

At the beginning of every semester, the corresponding academic calendar is circulated among all faculty members, mentioning the respective dates for sessional examinations, evaluation and related matters. In addition to this, the institution sends regular communication via circulars to the faculty members just before the start of the examinations mentioning the last date for evaluation and submission of marks. This ensures that the concerned are able to meet the relevant deadlines and the resultant declaration of results happens on time. If there are exceptions in meeting deadlines, an explanation is sought from the concerned faculty member/s. Any relevant and persistent issues related to the examinations and evaluation are further discussed in faculty meetings and suitable remedial measures introduced. With the COVID-induced lockdowns and restrictions, the curriculum was covered through virtual sessions for theory courses and a combined virtual demonstration followed by onsite classes for practical courses. Academic calendar

courses and a combined virtual demonstration followed by onsite classes for practical courses. Academic calendar and time schedules for each of these sessions were prepared in advance, communicated to all stakeholders and adhered to, despite the fluidity of the situation throughout the year. Examinations were also conducted either virtually or onsite, so that student learning and progress were not delayed.

The students elect the Student Council at the start of every academic year, through a voting process. All programs have elected representatives in the Council. The elected members choose further student representatives for various committees of the council. There are seven such committees including cultural, editorial, finance, photography, social, social media and sports. The cultural committee in turn has clubs for dance, arts and drama, debate and such. The Student Council elected during 2019-20 organized, conducted and participated in several events of the School and the university. The students actively participated in all UGC-mandated activities such as the Rashtriya Ekta Divas, Matribasha Divas, Vigilance Awareness Week and Swachhata Pakhwada, among others including Independence and Republic days, and Teachers Day. The Students Council and several students helped in the conduct of open science exhibition as part of the National Science Day celebrations at the School. In addition, there were active contributions through social committee in conducting mental health awareness programs, organizing visit to old age home and teaching schoolchildren. The sports committee was involved in organizing athletic and sports events throughout the year, including Annual Athletic Meet. The literary and cultural committee organized two events of 'Primer', an intra-college fest of cultural extravaganza. However, the pandemic put paid to conduct and participation in 'Utsav' – the inter-college university cultural fest. The students also celebrated Onam, Deepavali and Halloween in the year. The Annual Day was also cancelled due to the pandemic.

The President of the Student Council has representation in the Board of Studies meetings as well as the IQAC meetings. Nominees of the council attend these meetings. In addition, students represent the School in university-level meetings pertaining to student affairs, hostels, sports events, cultural activities among others. All their contributions are discussed and implemented as applicable.

MSLS has a well-built management information system to support smooth interaction and activities for students, faculty members, staff and management through various portals such as Student Information Systems (SIS), Students Lifecycle Management (SLcM), Employee Service Platform (ESP), Purchase Management through PeopleSoft portal, among others, supported by MAHE, Manipal

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

- 6.2.1 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following (within 100 words each):
 - Curriculum Development: The curriculum for all the programs at the School are regularly scrutinized for the content, relevance and suitability to the program and contemporariness for the graduating students, while also ensuring compliance to the regulatory requirements. Towards this, experts from academia and industry, both in India and abroad are approached for their inputs, based on which the necessary modifications for existing programs and development of curriculum for new programs are carried out. The Board of Studies and Academic Senate of the institution play an important role in ensuring the relevance and approval of all the curricula of the School.
 - ❖ Teaching and Learning: Teaching processes are streamlined through requirements for teaching schedule,

completion of syllabus, examination and evaluation on time, matching that described in the academic calendar, through the use of classroom and online teaching, audio-visual aids, practical sessions and other modes prescribed in the curriculum. Learning is monitored through continuous assessment and evaluation of the students, coaching class as required and by involving parents, where required. Efforts made to minimize absenteeism in classes by mandating attendance for appearing in sessional examinations are being monitored for effectiveness

- Examination and Evaluation: All examinations for UG, PG and PGD programs are conducted with the help of digital e-pads, without the use of papers and other online tools available. The evaluation is thus digital and paperless, thereby helping in faster completion of the evaluation and declaration of results. Students also have the option of supplementary examinations soon after results declaration, thereby ensuring that their second chance at repeating examinations happens sooner, without the loss of time.
- Research and Development: With research being the primary focus of the School, the number and quantum of support for research projects from national and international funding agencies have been prioritized, resulting in an increase and diversity of the research areas. This has also resulted in improvement in the quality and quantity of research outcomes in terms of publications in top-quartile, indexed journals and patent applications. Infrastructure upgradation, improvement and maintenance has been identified as a requirement and suitable measures are underway to address the same.
- Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation: The library resources are centralized at the MAHE Health Sciences Library, although the School maintains a relatively small collection of about 400 books in its own library. The entire campus is Wi-Fi enabled and equipped with necessary computers and other connectivity tools to impart teaching and enable learning. The School has one of the modern infrastructure, research instrumentation including high-end equipment and diverse scientific facilities available in this region of the country.
- Human Resource Management
- ❖ Industry Interaction / Collaboration: The School actively seeks and promotes industry collaborations through intermittent interactions. Research programs have industry partners where necessary. The School hosts the BiSEP PG Diploma program in Cellular and Molecular Diagnostics supported by the Government of Karnataka, which requires active collaborations with the industry since students undertake internship with such industrial partners every year. Thus, the School initiates frequent interactions through lectures, seminars, webinars and other drives to ensure that personnel from industry are associated with the activities of the School. In addition, the School has also MoUs with industries across the country.
- ❖ Admission of Students: Through concerted efforts by the institution and associated departments at the university, admissions to all programs were satisfactorily completed as per requirements. The entrance examinations for PG programs were conducted separately to ensure better distribution of interested applicants and quality of admissions.

<u>Title of the Best Practices</u> - Research Project work in all degree programs

Objectives: To provide research laboratory exposure to all students graduating from the various programs offered by MSLS, MAHE.

The context: Scientific research in the areas related to biotechnology and bioinformatics require scientific knowledge, technical skills and an ability to interpret data and innovate. Such skills are acquired only through hands-on experimentation and exposure to a laboratory/research environment. When such concept is introduced in the curricula, its implementation is streamlined.

The Practice: Every program offered by MSLS, MAHE culminates in a research project for a period of at least one semester, wherein students pursue laboratory work on a set of aims and objectives, collate and present the results in the form of a dissertation and defend the same during a viva-voce examination. This provides them with the exposure to

the research laboratory set-up and the experience that helps them in their future endeavours.

Evidence of Success: Close to three-fourths of the graduates choose to pursue a higher degree involving research component or in technical positions in an industrial set-up. Their hands-on research exposure during their degree programs facilitates their admission and/or employment

<u>Title of the Best Practices</u> – Advanced diagnostic services for patients

Objectives: To provide high-end diagnostic tests to the needy patients of hospitals in and around Manipal on a not-for-profit basis.

The context: Patients visiting several hospitals in the Udupi, Dakshina Kannada and other neighbouring districts have limited access to high-end molecular and/or cytogenetic diagnostic tests, or have to pay exorbitant costs in sample transport and examination. A provision for conducting such advanced diagnostic procedures in close proximity will help such individuals and families, more so if it is done not-for-profit.

The Practice: MSLS, over the course of its decade of existence, has developed infrastructure and in-house capability to perform tests related to DNA sequencing, karyotyping, cytogenetics, and metal estimation. These tests are provided to patients reporting to collaborating hospitals in the region.

Evidence of Success: The diagnostic facilities at MSLS are being used by the respective hospitals of the regions to the tune of about 600-700 samples on average being tested at our facilities every year.

7.3 Institutional Distinctiveness

The Manipal School of Life Sciences (MAHE, Manipal) focuses on research in the areas of human health using biotechnological interventions, specifically towards diseases such as cancers, infectious, genetic, inherited and metabolic disorders. Recent research in these and associated areas has resulted in close to 200 peer-reviewed and high impact publications in renowned journals in the past five years, through targeted approaches in promoting scientific research in such areas. With 3 granted patents and about 10 more filed patent applications at different stages of scrutiny, faculty members and student researchers continue to make an annual conference presentations and publications. Despite the continued severe problems forced by the coronavirus pandemic, the academic year 2020-21 reflected the continued pursuit of research goals in these thrust and other associated areas. Conferences, symposia, workshops and guest lectures were conducted virtually to promote, share and disseminate knowledge and expertise in the thrust areas of the School. The School continues to expand its horizons through the development of new curriculum for new PG programs such as the one started this year in the area of Genome Engineering, while pushing for new frontiers in its research areas. This has resulted in the plans for novel MSc programs in the areas of Tissue Engineering and Molecular Biophysics in the coming years.
